

Sunday night, two weeks ago, four young people from our church and I took a bus through the night from Lima to Sullana, a trip of about 14 hours. My friend Segundo met us there in Sullana on Monday morning. We began preaching on Monday night. The church is a large church for Peru with a Sunday attendance of between 200 and 300 folks. They have a Christian school with over 500 students, eighty percent of which are unsaved. Each day we had a chapel with each of the levels in the school (kindergarten, elementary, and high school). Segundo and I preached the high school chapels. We focused the first two days on the reality of God. I preached from James 4:13-17 emphasizing the foolishness of living your life with out God. Segundo followed up the next day with a message from Ecclesiastes emphasizing the same thing. The third day I preached the gospel and there was a great response with around 20 teens responding for salvation.

Each day from 3:00-5:00 Segundo and I preached a series of workshops for leaders in the church. At night, we held revival and evangelistic meetings for the church. For those services, we met outside in their courtyard area in the middle of their property to make room for visitors and folks from neighboring churches. Each morning, I met with the group of young people who had come with us. They read a short revival book called *The Calvary Road* before coming on the trip and we centered our study around the themes presented in that book; brokenness, filling of the Spirit, openness, submission, humility, etc. My goal was to push the young people toward a deeper walk with God encouraging them toward a life of brokenness and true revival. God is at work in them and my confidence is in God as we seek genuine fruit in their lives.

The church in Sullana has bought a piece of property in the country to use as a camp. They took me out there twice last week and asked me to help them design the site and give suggestions. If a friend of mine from Northland Camp can come with me, then I'm planning to go back up there sometime early next year to help teach them camp philosophy, plan their site, suggest activities and whatever else we can do to help them run a first-class Christian camp.

Thank you for all of those who prayed for us on this trip. Thank you to those who prayed for Cheryl and the children while I was gone. They did great and the Lord protected them. Continue to pray for Cheryl as she keeps working at Spanish. She is learning well and we want that to continue.

I will give you an update soon concerning the rebuilding we are involved with in the earthquake region. We have some decisions to make with that and I would ask you to pray for us to have wisdom. I will probably have to make a trip down there sometime in next few weeks to help make some of those decisions.
